BAPTISM:

The sacrament of Baptism (English, Polish) is celebrated on the 2nd and 4th weekends of the month. Because our parish family is welcoming a new member to our faith community, Baptisms will be celebrated during the following Masses: 5PM Saturday vigil Mass in English, 9:30AM Polish Mass, or 11AM Mass in English. There will be no private Baptisms. Those chosen as Godparents must be practicing, Confirmed Catholics whose lives reflect a commitment to the Catholic faith and to the role of Godparent. In order to receive a Sponsorship Certificate required by all Godparents, prospective Godmothers and Godfathers must be registered and supporting parishioners of Saint Ladislaus Church. Parents must register their child prior to the Baptism. Parents of first children are required to receive instruction. The sacrament of Baptism (Spanish) is celebrated during the 4PM Mass on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month. Guidelines for pre-Baptismal registration and instruction are the same for all Baptisms.

The Creche~ A Beloved Sight

On Christmas Eve we climb the steps to our beautiful church with a feeling of eager anticipation. Having spent busy weeks in preparation for Christmas, we reach the moment for which we have waited. We enter a sacred space that has an atmosphere like no other place. The church organ sends forth familiar hymns, adding to the holy peace that fills the church. Our gaze goes directly to the creche. What quiet beauty is found in the simplicity of the Nativity scene! The figures, though well familiar to us, hold our attention. O holy night!

We recall that the earliest depictions of the Christ Child in the manger were found only *inside* the churches. Because of the innovative idea of Saint Francis of Assisi, the manger scene was eventually moved to an outdoor setting. We are familiar with Saint Francis' distaste for opulence and extravagance. He favored a humbler, more realistic image of the scene at Bethlehem. We also know of St. Francis' love of animals. He sought the help of a friend, who made a simple, rustic crib that was filled with hay. Francis then gathered live animals to be part of the scene.

When prayerful pilgrims went to the Italian village of Greccio on Christmas Eve in the year 1223, they were delighted to behold the simple but beautiful manger scene now with a rustic element to which they could relate. We can imagine the crowds of people bearing candles and torches coming together under a night sky and rejoicing in front of the creche.

As we fast forward to our present day, we are aware that there are hundreds of types of creches that can be purchased. Some are rough hewn, and others are made of costly materials. No matter the style of Nativity scene that you choose to place in your home, it still has the same effect. A creche creates a feeling of peace within us. Its quiet and holy presence prompts prayer and reflection. For a moment, we imagine ourselves as being a part of the scene, close to the baby who would become our Savior. O, holy night....indeed.
