BAPTISM:

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated on weekends.

Baptisms will be celebrated *during* the following Masses: 5PM Saturday Vigil Mass (Eng.), Sunday 8AM (Eng.) 9:30AM(Polish), or 4PM (Spanish). (*Note:* Baptisms during the 4PM Spanish Mass are celebrated on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month.) Parents who want to arrange a Baptism need to come to the rectory office and provide the child's birth certificate. Parents of first children are required to receive instruction prior to the baptism. Those chosen as Godparents must be practicing, Confirmed Catholics whose lives reflect a commitment to the Catholic faith and to the role of Godparent. All Godparents need to obtain a document of sponsorship from the parish *where they are registered members*.

MARRIAGES: Arrange *at least* six months before the date.

May: Litany to the Blessed Virgin Mary after each Sunday Mass

October: Decade of the Rosary after Sunday Masses

Lent: Stations of the Cross every Friday after the 7:30 AM Mass in English; 7:30 PM in Polish.



The Month of Mary

When we contemplate the Blessed Mother, the word *gentleness* comes to mind. Her humble and gentle manner do not reflect weakness; rather, as a role model of faith in action, she possessed a gentle strength. When visited by the angel Gabriel, a young Mary responded to the news of her bearing a child with the words, "Be it done unto me according to Your Word." We think of Mary as an expectant mother walking miles to visit and help her older cousin Elizabeth. We think of her bravely travelling with Joseph and hoping for a safe haven as she was about to give birth. Years later, Mary's concern for the couple married in Cana prompted our Lord to perform a miracle. Mary's quiet wisdom and strength were clothed in gentleness and grace.



The celebration of motherhood goes back to ancient Greek and Roman times. Yes, mothers have always been recognized as special people! A Christian festival known as Mothering Sunday started in 16th century England, when the fourth Sunday in Lent included a prayer service to the Blessed Mother followed by the presentation of gifts and flowers by children. Our modern idea of Mother's Day came in the 20th century, when, in 1914, President Woodrow Wilson established the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day. The actual idea for such a holiday had been conceived earlier by...a mother! Anna Jarvis proposed the idea of celebrating all mothers and their many contributions to society. Mrs. Jarvis chose the carnation as the flower to be associated with Mother's Day. The petals never fall from dying carnations; they cling to the flower just as children cling to their mothers.
