

BAPTISM:

The sacrament of Baptism (English, Polish) is celebrated on the 2nd and 4th weekends of the month. Because our parish family is welcoming a new member to our faith community, Baptisms will be celebrated during the following Masses: 5PM Saturday vigil Mass in English, 9:30AM Polish Mass, or 11AM Mass in English. There will be no private Baptisms. Those chosen as Godparents must be practicing, Confirmed Catholics whose lives reflect a commitment to the Catholic faith and to the role of Godparent. Parents must register their child prior to the Baptism. Parents of first children are required to receive instruction. The sacrament of Baptism (Spanish) is celebrated during the 4PM Mass on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month. Guidelines for pre-Baptismal registration and instruction are the same for all Baptisms.



Monday, January 20 REMINDER: Next Sunday, January 26, the Polish choir ARIA will sing during the 9:30 AM Polish Mass.

This Wednesday, January 22, has been the day designated by the Catholic Church in the United States as the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children." We are reminded to reflect on the precious gift of life and to pray for the legal protection of human life. We are also called to do penance for the violations against human life committed through abortion. The US Conference of Catholic Bishops has introduced a national novena entitled "9 Days for Life." This novena begins on January 21 and runs through January 29. We are invited to join Catholics nationwide on each of these nine days and recite a daily reflection.
