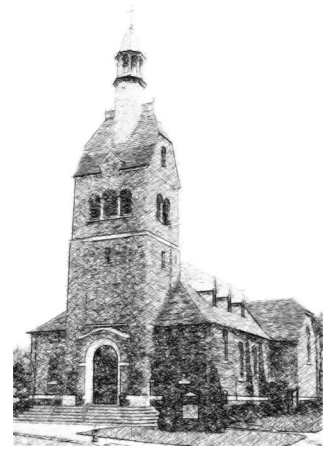

BAPTISM:

The sacrament of Baptism (English, Polish) is celebrated on the 2nd and 4th weekends of the month. Because our parish family is welcoming a new member to our faith community, Baptisms will be celebrated *during* the following Masses: 5PM Saturday vigil Mass in English, 9:30AM Polish Mass, or 11AM Mass in English. *There will be no private Baptisms.* Those chosen as Godparents must be practicing, Confirmed Catholics whose lives reflect a commitment to the Catholic faith and to the role of Godparent. In order to receive a Sponsorship Certificate required by all Godparents, prospective Godmothers and Godfathers must be registered and supporting parishioners of Saint Ladislaus Church. *Parents must register their child prior to the Baptism.* Parents of first children are required to receive instruction. **The sacrament of Baptism (Spanish) is celebrated during the 4PM Mass on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month.** Guidelines for pre-Baptismal registration and instruction are the same for all Baptisms.

MARRIAGES: Arrange *at least* six months before the date.

DEVOTIONS:

May: Litany to the Blessed Virgin Mary after each Sunday Mass

October: Decade of the Rosary after Sunday Masses

Lent: Stations of the Cross every Friday at 7:00 PM in English, 7:30 PM in Polish. Gorzkie Żale on Sundays in Lent following the 9:30AM Polish Mass.

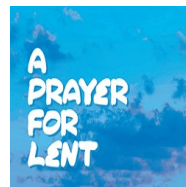

One of our Lenten practices is fasting, by which we think of the poor while giving up some of the bounty that we have. Why not choose a night when all of your family will be gathered around the table and schedule a simple soup supper? A pot of soup and a loaf of bread can be the springboard for prayer and reflection. If there will be children at the table, get them involved by giving them construction paper and crayons and having them design placemats for the meal. They will know that they are helping to prepare something special for the supper. (Make sure that they include the Lenten color purple in their drawing.) While your soup is heating, Mom or Dad can take small pieces of paper and write words related to Lent (ie. desert, palms, thorns, etc.) on them. Put one under each person's dish. Start a discussion of the significance of that word to this holy season. If only adults are seated at the table, you can write Scripture verses on strips of paper and discuss them during the meal. If you are pressed for time, simply write the names of people in your immediate or extended family on strips of paper and have each person offer a prayer for the person whose name was read. You may leave the table satisfied not only with the meal, but with the knowledge that you have started a tradition by which you have passed on the faith.



Remember that you are called to be holy, and holy you can be.

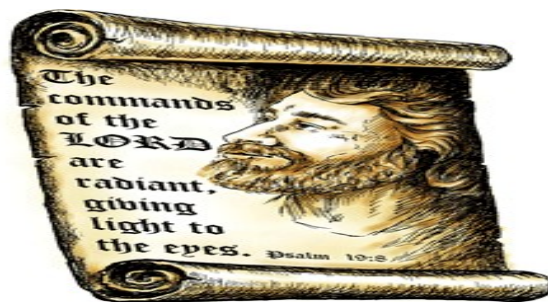
