## BAPTISM:

**The sacrament of Baptism (English, Polish) is celebrated on the 2nd and 4th weekends of the month.** Because our parish family is welcoming a new member to our faith community, Baptisms will be celebrated *during* the following Masses: 5PM Saturday vigil Mass in English, 9:30AM Polish Mass, or 11AM Mass in English. *There will be no private Baptisms.* Those chosen as Godparents must be practicing, Confirmed Catholics whose lives reflect a commitment to the Catholic faith and to the role of Godparent. In order to receive a Sponsorship Certificate required by all Godparents, prospective Godmothers and Godfathers must be registered and supporting parishioners of Saint Ladislaus Church. *Parents must register their child prior to the Baptism.* Parents of first children are required to receive instruction. **The sacrament of Baptism (Spanish) is celebrated during the 4PM Mass on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month.** Guidelines for pre-Baptismal registration and instruction are the same for all Baptisms.

**MARRIAGES:** Arrange *at least* six months before the date.

**May:** Litany to the Blessed Virgin Mary after each Sunday Mass

**October:** Decade of the Rosary after Sunday Masses

**Lent:** Stations of the Cross every Friday at 7:00 PM in English, 7:30 PM in Polish. Gorzkie Żale on Sundays in Lent following the 9:30AM Polish Mass.

## Living Our Faith throughout Lent and Beyond These Forty Days

This holy season of Lent is a powerful reminder of our faith and the significance it has in every aspect of our lives. As we reflect on the part that our faith plays in our daily existence, we come to realize that it influences our lives as parents, children, spouses, friends, students, employers, employees, and so forth. No matter which of these roles we assume throughout our lives, our faith affects how we *live* that role...the decisions and choices we make, the ways we solve the problems each role presents, and the manner in which we deal with interpersonal relationships. Our faith prompts us to act according to God's Law of Love. It guides us in difficult situations. This week we focus on Abraham, who, when faced with a serious dilemma, rose above fear and anxiety and placed his trust in a living *and* loving God. As Catholics, we do the same, often without realizing it. That seed of faith planted within us calls us to action....to do God's will. During Lent, we water our seed of faith with our prayers, our acts of charity, and our denial of self. By nurturing our faith, it grows in strength and becomes an all-embracing part of our identity. We become veritable witnesses of faith, active *stewards* of the faith, opening *the door to faith* to those around us.

### Lenten Practices for Children



How do we introduce our young children (under the age of 14) to the practices of Lent so that this holiest of seasons becomes something that they can understand and feel good about observing?

Young children are primarily visual learners. They like concrete, tangible things to enhance their learning experience. If you don't have a purple cloth to show them the color associated with Lent, you can use a piece of purple felt to cover a small table. You can visit a craft store and purchase a bag of sand, which will be placed in a bowl to remind children that Jesus was in the desert for 40 days. Have them draw a symbol of the Cross in the box of a calendar at the end of each Lenten day. Invite them to join you in prayer as they do so, thus fulfilling the obligation to *pray* during Lent. Visit the church, and walk through the Stations of the Cross with your children. We don't like to deny children food, but the idea of **fasting** can be tied to the practice of **almsgiving**. If your children ask you for money for ice cream or candy, you might ask them to put the cost of that item in a little bowl. At the end of Lent, you can take them to the grocery store and have them pick out something to give to a local food pantry. By doing so, you have introduced the concepts of *sacrifice and charity, a denial of self and concern for others*.

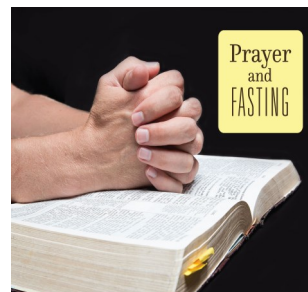
